FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM?

- To recycle materials so as not to continue the use and high cost of raw materials and natural resources
- Reduces the amount of materials going into landfills, therefore prolonging the life of the landfill
- Reduces pollution - it takes less energy and water to make an item out of recycled materials than raw materials.

WHAT CAN BE RECYCLED?

No need to separate recyclables. The City encourages all residents to participate in curbside recycling.

- Newsprint with inserts and magazines
- Brown, clear and green glass containers
- Aluminum beverage containers
- Steel cans and plastic bottles
- Corrugated cardboard
- Office paper and residential mixed paper (junk mail, catalogs and paper board such as cereal/food boxes)

You cannot recycle: sheet glass, mirrors, ceramics, china, plastic bags or cellophane film, styrofoam, soggy or waxed paper/cardboard, petroleum product containers, like oil quarts or oil jugs, and plastic toys.

WHAT IS THE COLLECTION SCHEDULE?

- Pickup schedule begins Monday, July 7, due to the July 4th holiday
- Recyclables will be collected in a separate cart
- Carts will be delivered to households throughout the month of June

WHO RECEIVES THIS SERVICE?

- City residents in single-family households
- Seven recycling dropoff sites will remain open for multi-family units, including:
 - College Lakes Park at 701 Tranquil Drive
 - Ann Street Landfill at 698 Ann Street
 - Massey Hill Recreation Center at 1612 Camden Road
 - Fire Station No. 17 at 6701 Bailey Lake Road
 - Cliffdale Location at 7581 Lowell Harris Road
 - Fire Station No. 9 at 5091 Santa Fe Drive
 - Honeycutt Park at 2605 Fort Bragg Road
- These locations accept plastic containers, newspapers and magazines

WHAT IS THE FEE?

A \$42 fee will appear on all single-family household property owner's tax bill around August. The fee must be paid as part of the tax bill.

WHAT DO YOU HAVE TO DO BEFORE PUTTING ITEMS IN THE CART?

- Citizens must remove products (food, drink, etc.) by rinsing once
- Labels do not need to be removed
- Caps do not need to be removed
- Person can smash or not smash the container (plastic milk jugs, soda bottles, etc.).

WHAT IF YOU HAVE TOO MANY RECYCLABLES TO FIT IN THE 35-GALLON CART?

The City is working on options for "super recyclers."

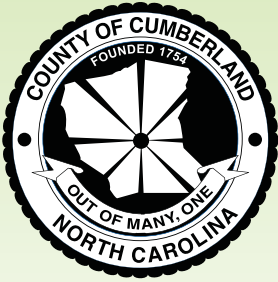
WHAT ABOUT PEOPLE IN MULTI-FAMILY DWELLINGS?
